To date, Dr. Sick has mentored 54 students who have entered veterinary schools around the country and the world.

Dr. Sick served on several IVMA committees over the years, including the Administrative Committee when he was President of the IVMA in 2006. Although retired, he continues his involvement as an IVMA Foundation Fellow and a Sustaining PAC member.

Outside of veterinary medicine, Dr. Sick has served as an officer or director for the American Legion, Lions Club, Sioux Center Chamber of Commerce, Sioux County ISU Ag Extension Council, and the Iowa Association of Extension Councils. PRESIDENT'S AWARD

The President's Award recipient is chosen by the IVMA President and recognizes an individual(s) or organization who has had a positive impact on the veterinary profession, IVMA, animal health and welfare and/or public health. This year President Dr. Shawn Nicholson chose two people to receive the President's Award.

The first recipient is Dr. Rex Wilhelm of Stuart. Dr. Wilhelm is a 1968 graduate of Iowa State University College of Veterinary Medicine and started working at Stuart Veterinary Clinic right out of veterinary school. After a few years he bought the practice from Dr. Wayne Cook and hired two other veterinarians, Dr. Cary Christensen and Dr. David Schmitt.

Dr. Wilhelm has been involved in many research trials over the years that have helped the veterinary profession diagnose and treat various important livestock pathogens. One example was testing the use of Pulmotil to control respiratory disease in swine. Dr. Wilhelm was also the first veterinarian to diagnose/recognize

coronavirus as both an enteric and respiratory pathogen in cattle.

Dr. Wilhelm has served on many boards for the veterinary profession including the Iowa Board of Veterinary Medicine for 9 years, with several years as chairman. He served on the IVMA's Bovine Committee and Iowa State University College of Veterinary Medicine's Admissions Committee. Dr. Wilhelm has also served 5 years on the American Veterinary Medical Association's (AVMA) Council on Education doing on-site assessments of veterinary colleges seeking accreditation. In 1991, Dr. Wilhelm was presented with the IVMA Veterinarian of the Year award.

Over the years, Dr. Wilhelm has mentored many veterinary students and veterinarians who practice all over the country. Dr. Nicholson says, "During my years of working with him, Rex was always there to give me a hand or answer a question. He also allowed me to make my own mistakes when needed. Rex taught me the importance of asking questions to challenge the status quo. He was also tremendous at using technology and data analysis to enhance his veterinary practice. Probably the best lesson I learned from him was understanding the utmost importance of being with family and having leisure time. There's never enough of this when you're a veterinarian but when you can, you make the most of it."
